1. H.R. 2, to repeal the "ObamaCare" health care law (01/19/2011, Roll Call No. 14)

H.R. 2, sponsored by pro-life House Majority Leader Eric Cantor (R-Va.), is a bill to completely repeal the "Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act" (PPACA), the massive healthcare restructuring law that was enacted in March, 2010 (Public Law 111-148), sometimes referred to as "ObamaCare." As enacted, the PPACA contains multiple provisions that will, if fully implemented, result in government-imposed rationing of lifesaving medical care, which are documented here. In addition, the PPACA also contains multiple provisions authorizing federal subsidies for abortion, and additional provisions on which future abortion-expanding regulatory mandates may be based. The abortion-subsidizing and abortion-expanding provisions of the law are thoroughly documented in materials posted on the NRLC website here. For these reasons, the National Right to Life Committee (NRLC) strongly supports repeal of the PPACA, as explained in a letter sent to U.S. House members endorsing this repealer bill, H.R. 2, posted here. On January 19, 2011, the House of Representatives passed H.R. 2 by a vote of 245 to 189. The repealer bill was supported by 242 Republicans and three Democrats. All 189 opponents were Democrats. Subsequently, the U.S. Senate did not approve this bill. House roll call no. 14, January 19, 2011.

2. Cut off federal funds to Planned Parenthood (Pence Amendment) (02/19/2011, Roll Call No. 93)

During consideration of an appropriations bill (H.R. 1) to fund all federal agencies through September 30, 2011, Rep. Mike Pence (R-In.) offered an amendment to prohibit any federal funds, from any program, from going to the Planned Parenthood Federation of America (PPFA) or its affiliates, which were listed by name in the text of the amendment. In a February 14 letter to House members, NRLC urged adoption of the Pence Amendment, saying, "PPFA is the nation's largest abortion provider, reporting 324,008 abortions in 2008. . . . According to press reports, PPFA has recently mandated that all of its regional affiliates must provide abortions by the end of 2013." The Pence Amendment was adopted, 240 to 185, with one House member voting "present" and seven members not voting. The Pence Amendment was supported by 230 Republicans and 10 Democrats. It was opposed by seven Republicans and 178 Democrats. (To view a statement released by NRLC immediately after the vote, click [here](#).) However, H.R. 1 was not approved by the Senate and did not become law. February 18, 2011, House roll call no. 93.

3. Block funding for Obama health care law (04/14/2011, Roll Call No. 270)

H. Con. Res. 35 was a measure to block funding for implementation of President Obama's 2010 health care law (the "Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act" or PPACA) for the remainder of Fiscal Year 2011. As enacted, the PPACA contains multiple provisions that will, if fully implemented, result in government-imposed rationing of lifesaving medical care, which are documented here. In addition, the PPACA also contains multiple provisions authorizing federal subsidies for abortion, and additional provisions on which future abortion-expanding regulatory mandates may be based. The abortion-subsidizing and abortion-expanding provisions of the law are thoroughly documented in materials posted on the NRLC website here. NRLC strongly supported H. Con. Res. 35, which passed the House on April 14, 2011, by a vote of 240 to 185. (House roll call no. 270.) The bill was supported by 237 Republicans and three Democrats. All 185 opponents were Democrats. The bill was then sent to the Senate, which defeated it later on the same day.

4. Cut off federal funds to Planned Parenthood (04/14/2011, Roll Call No. 271)

H. Con. Res. 36 was a bill, supported by National Right to Life, to cut off all federal funds to the Planned Parenthood Federation of America (PPFA) and its affiliates, for the remainder of Fiscal Year 2011. On April 14, 2011, the bill passed the House, 241 to 185, with one House member voting "present" and five members not voting. The bill was supported by 231 Republicans and 10 Democrats. It was opposed by seven Republicans and 178 Democrats. (House roll call no. 271.) The House then sent the bill to the Senate, which defeated it later on the same day.

5. No Taxpayer Funding for Abortion Act (H.R. 3): passage (05/04/2011, Roll Call No. 292)

The No Taxpayer Funding for Abortion Act (H.R. 3), sponsored by Reps. Chris Smith (R-NJ) and Dan Lipinski (D-IL), would establish a permanent prohibition of subsidies for abortion and health insurance coverage of abortion in federal programs -- both longstanding federal programs and the health care law signed by President Obama in 2010. The bill would also close certain loopholes that give tax-preferred status to abortion, and would codify and strengthen existing conscience protections for pro-life health care providers. The House of Representatives passed H.R. 3 on May 4, 2011, by a vote of 251 to 175. The bill was supported by 235 Republicans and 16 Democrats. It was opposed by 175 Democrats and no Republicans. (Seven House members did not vote, and two seats were vacant.) The Senate did not act on the bill.

6. Use of federal funds to train abortionists; conscience protection (05/25/2011, Roll Call No. 338)

This roll call occurred on an amendment offered by pro-life Rep. Virginia Foxx (R-NC) to a bill (H.R. 1216) dealing with a program that provides federal funds to help community-based "teaching health centers" to train residents in certain fields of medicine. The Foxx Amendment, which was strongly supported by NRLC, would prohibit the federal funds from being used to perform abortions or to train doctors to perform abortions, with narrow exceptions. The Foxx Amendment also prohibited any medical center that receives funds from this program from discriminating against any doctor, nurse, or other health care provider on grounds that the provider refused to "provide, pay for, provide coverage of, or refer for abortions." The Foxx Amendment was adopted 234-182. It was supported by 221 Republicans and 13 Democrats. It was opposed by 10 Republicans and 172 Democrats. H.R. 1216, as amended, was then approved and sent to the U.S. Senate, which took no action on the bill. House roll call no. 338, May 25, 2011.
